## Sharon Gless in "Hannah Free"

"Hannah Free," a new lesbian romantic film, will be premiered in Tucson on Tuesday, March 30, at The Loft Cinema, 3233 E. Speedway. A reception starts at 6:30 pm. with the screening at 7:30 pm.

Starring Sharon Gless, whose considerable lesbian following dates from her '80's television series "Cagney and Lacey," the \$10 admission is a fundraiser for Wingspan.

The film portrays the story of two women who grow up in the same small midwest town, weaves back and forth between past and present, revealing how the women maintained their love affair despite a marriage, world war, infidelities and family denial.

At the film's outset, Hannah, unable to walk, is confined to a nursing facility where her longtime lover, Rachel, lies dying in a separate wing. Denied access to the woman she loves, Hannah remembers the two as children, young lovers, adults and her adventures exploring the world—these memories are depicted in flashbacks.

"Even at death's door, a lesbian couple still find peace elusive," says the New York Times. The film dramatizes many issues LGBT elders face including prejudices against the elderly compounded by homophobia, family divisions, patronizing caretakers, and overzealous religious proselytizers.

As the LA Gay & Lesbian Center points out, "all of us are required to pay into Social Security equally, but many LGBT seniors are denied vital benefits afforded to others. This is wrong no matter what city, state, country, or planet you are from."

The NGLTF report, *Outing Age 2010*, states that "While widows and widowers or even divorced spouses can count on a portion of the deceased's Social Security income, this does not apply to non-married partners..."

The two organizations have joined together to form "Rock for Equality" to "fight to eliminate the unfair and unequal Social Security policies." Protests will take place April 11 in Los Angeles and April 18 in Washington, D.C.

**Pima County Access Program (PCAP)**

PCAP is a program which provides discounts for medical care to eligible adults and children in Pima County. Eligibility is based on gross monthly income and family size ( for a single person - \$903 to \$2256 a month). There are many enrollment sites throughout Pima County and one of them is Wingspan! A representative is on hand every Monday from 11AM to 1PM to answer questions and enroll members. Some of the services provided include primary care and specialty services, inpatient and outpatient services, lab work, radiology and physical

### **SAGE Receives Federal Grant for National LGBT Resource Center**

Services & Advocacy for Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual & Transgender Elders (SAGE) has been awarded a three-year, \$900,000 grant to create the first and only national resource center on LGBT aging.

HHS Secretary Kathleen Sebelius announced the grant in early February, saying "The Resource Center will provide information, assistance and resources for both mainstream aging organizations and LGBT organizations and will provide assistance to LGBT individuals as they plan for future long-term care needs."

The group's plans: "In creating the Resource Center, SAGE will forge a partnership with 10 organizations with expertise in a wide range of areas including mainstream aging, LGBT aging, culture change and competency and program evaluation. These organizations include PHI (a national training expert), the National Association of Area Agencies on Aging (n4a), the National Council on Aging's National Institute of Senior Centers, the American Society on Aging, the Brookdale Center for Healthy Aging and Longevity, Centerlink (the national association of LGBT community centers), GRIOT Circle, FORGE Transgender Aging Network, Third Sector New England/The LGBT Aging Project, and openhouse. The Resource Center will seek to engage, empower and support mainstream aging providers, LGBT providers and LGBT older adults to ensure that LGBT elders have the necessary and culturally appropriate supports and services to successfully age in place. Among other tools, SAGE plans to develop a comprehensive, web-based clearinghouse targeting all three audiences. The clearinghouse will include diverse resources, social networking tools, an "Ask the Experts" service, web-based trainings and other features."

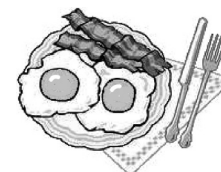
